### From the Frog Pond

I hope everyone will take time to look at the new WNRCD website. It has a new look and an interactive blog function. It you see something you think needs to be on there, let Diana know. It's a work in progress.

The Arizona Association of NRCDs, of which Winkelman is a member, had their annual Legislative Meeting last month. We met with many legislators, some rural and some urban, to let them know what the Districts in their districts have been doing for conservation and protection of the local tax base. Many have never been exposed to the volunteer district conservation model and are truly surprised at the many things the districts around the state are involved in.

There are three bills in the legislature this year that, if passed, will affect the performance of the districts. SB1167 will allow each district to request from the legislature \$50,000 per year and each Ed Center \$60,000 per year. Currently they are capped at \$13,000 and \$30,000 per year. All of our legislators have signed on as sponsors with Sen McGuire being the prime sponsor. When you see them tell them thanks.

Also in the works is SB 1214. This bill recognizes that districts are local units of state

government and that they have "special expertise" in natural resources within their districts. This language is important for coordination with federal agencies. Language in NEPA and FLPMA mandates that they seek consistency with local government plans whenever they are making their plans.

The last one is SB1292 which amends the Arizona Resource Advisory Council. This council advises the BLM and other federal agencies that own lands in Arizona. It identifies who will be represented on the council. The Governor, the Speaker of the House and the Senate President each get to appoint members who represent various interests in the state. Each will appoint a person who "represents a nationally or recognized regionally environmental or conservation organization."

The Winkelman/Redington joint committee that was formed in response to the FWS refuge proposal has morphed into a watershed planning committee. Among the advisors to the committee are State Land Department, US Fish and Wildlife Service, Natural Resource Conservation Service, Arizona Land and Water Trust. We are reaching out to the other agencies that have a presence in the valley to join in the effort. Much more to come.


### 2014 Farm Bill

# **Next Generation Farmers and Ranchers**

## Before the 2014 Farm Bill

 The 2008 Farm Bill established the Beginning with \$75 million for FY 2009 to FY 2012. Farmers and Ranchers Development Program

### 2014 Farm Bill

- Provides \$100 million for the Beginning Farmers and Ranchers Development Program.
- Increases access to capital and supports crop insurance and risk management tools, including reducing crop insurance premiums during the first 5 years of farming.

# Local and Regional Food Systems

## Before the 2014 Farm Bill

- The Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP) funded at \$10 million annually

### 2014 Farm Bill

- Renames FMPP to "Farmers Market and Local Food Promotion Program" and provides \$30 million annually
- Continues to reserve funds in the Business & Industry Loan Program for locally- and regionally- focused businesses.
- Advances growth of local and regional food systems with \$65 million for Value Added Product Market Development Grants.

# Specialty Crops and Organics

Before the 2014 Farm Bill

- Funded the Specialty Crop Block Grant Program Provides \$72.5 million annually for SCBG
- (SCBG) at \$52 million annually to promote fruit Provides new resources for organic farmers, including funding the Organic Cost Share program at \$11.5 million annually
- Increases funding for pest and disease management and in FY 2018 and beyond. disaster prevention to \$62.5 million per year, and \$75 million




