NRCD Annual Report

Welcome to theWinkelman Natural Resource Conservation District's (NRCD) Annual
Report. My name isBill Dunn, as Chair of theWinkelman NRCD, I would like to
take a moment and explain what an NRCD is and inform you about the mission of our Board.
NRCD history is rooted in the problems of soil erosion from agricultural production of the Dust
Bowl era. The Federal Government established the now Natural Resources Conservation Service
(NRCS) to develop and demonstrate improved farming methods to help conserve our nation's
soil resources. NRCDs were conceived as the mechanism to involve and coordinate with local
landowners on the voluntary implementation of NRCS conservation practices on private lands.
States were encouraged by the Federal Government to adopt a "Standard Soil Conservation
District Law" that allowed for the establishment Conservation Districts as entities of state
government. Arizona passed its Conservation District Law in 1942 (Laws, 1941, Ch. 43, § 2).
Arizona NRCD Law grants its Conservation Districts the authority to:
Provide for the restoration and conservation of lands and soil resources of the state, the preservation of water rights and the control and prevention of soil erosion, and thereby to conserve natural resources, conserve wildlife, protect the tax base, protect public lands and protect and restore this state's rivers and streams and associated riparian habitats, including fish and wildlife resources that are dependent on those habitats, and in such manner to protect and promote the public health, safety and general welfare of the people. (A.R.S. § 37-1001 (A)
As mandated by the State of Arizona, our mission statement addresses the conservation of our
State's natural resources:
To promote sound and wise use of soil, plant, water, wildlife and other resources,
adopted on this date:_July 16, 2018

1.) Kearny River Fire Project 5.) RCPP & FEMA HMGP Grant

2.) Sunzia Transmission Project 6.)BLM 2.0 Planning Rule

3.) Native Plant Nursery 7.)Tonto National Forest Plan Coordination

4.) Create a District Coordinator Position 8.)

We are most proud of accomplishing the following project(s):

- Hired a consultant to represent the interests of the District and cooperators on the Sunzia Plan of Development, participated in on-site review and organized site visits with coordinators and SunZia to facilitate conflicts and recommend mitigation measures. We were able to keep the SunZia project away from some undisturbed petroglyphic sites, detour some construction roads away from sensitive areas and help SunZia procure water from cooperators for project construction.
- Applied for Fema/AZ Forestry grant to create a defensible space around Kearny & other river communities. Grant was awarded to WNRCD; then, it was modified & resubmitted. We have been awarded the grant and are awaiting final environmental clearances to begin work. Anticipate to begin work in October.
- Worked with one of our cooperators, two firebreaks were created in the riverbottom for the Town of Kearny.
- Hired a part-time district coordinator position.
